

West Side Story

The Senior production at Bromsgrove has become one of the undoubted highlights of the school calendar in recent years. This term saw forty-five students from the Senior school performing the iconic musical *West Side Story* to sell-out houses over four nights in the penultimate week of term. Those lucky enough to get a ticket for the production agreed that this year's effort was nothing short of outstanding in its professionalism, its vision and in the commitment of the entire ensemble. Bernstein's demanding but beautiful score was expertly conducted by Mr McKelvey; the extraordinary, multi-layered set and was designed and constructed by the Performing Art Technicians, Messers Jude & Poxon, while Mrs Whitfield once again created a magnificent collection of costumes for the entire cast thoughtfully suggesting with care the style, period and the character of each role.

Gabriel Brown sang the role of Tony with terrific confidence, accuracy and an apparent effortlessness that charmed the whole audience. He was ably matched by Olivia McKelvey as Maria, who broke hearts in the final dramatic moments of the play sobbing over the body of her dead lover. Joe Boardman, was a superbly intense Riff, while Ash Khachatryan brought a smouldering, panther-like energy to the part of Bernardo. Aaron Chan led an outstanding gang of Jets in the great crowd-pleasing number *Officer Krupke* almost bringing the show to a standstill on the last night, such was the strength of the audience's applause. Of Olivia Garrett's performance as Anita there can be no question of its maturity and power: she held everyone on the edge of their seat in the second half of the play and stripped open the brutal, dark violence of the piece.

The final plaudits must go to the cast as a whole; seldom have we witnessed such a uniformly strong and talented company, who sang, danced (what wonderful choreography from Mrs Arnold) and performed to an amazingly assured standard from the first menacing clicks of the Jets and Sharks, through the girls' Puerto Rican exuberance in *America* to the heartbreaking wail of Shusank Nembang's Doc. Every moment of this detailed and tightly rehearsed production was a highlight for its lucky audience, while for all on stage or in the crew, they clearly loving every moment; this was undoubtedly an experience they will never forget and a triumph on every level.

Congratulations to Dr West who recently attended his graduation ceremony after completing the Chartered Teacher Status course earlier this year.

Chartered Teacher Status aims to further develop your professional skills, practice and expertise in enhancing the learning experience and outcomes of students.

Dr West says that the pathway gave him an opportunity to engage in a variety of activities and assessments such as online debates, exams, literature reviews and critical reflections. The most powerful element was using evidence and research, for example in cognitive science, to understand more about how learning occurs and how different strategies can be used to maximise and reinforce learning.

BSRC

Dr Rimmer (Master of Scholars) hosted the sixth annual Bromsgrove School Research Competition. Students were asked to prepare to speak for five minutes, accompanied by a five-slide presentation, to answer the question: 'What piece of literature should be translated into local languages then distributed globally?'. Seven teams entered the competition: participants from Lower Fourth up to Lower Sixth all demonstrated excellent levels of research and public-speaking skills.

The judging panel was chaired by Dr Ruben accompanied by Mrs Bedford and Mrs Ashcroft.

The winning team comprised of Upper Fourth Form students Khai Nguyen, Samyam Rai, Oscar Gurung, Raymond Betiku, and Nathan Limb who impressed the judges with their pragmatic ideas on sharing 'Journey to the West' as an improving tale combined with comedy.



Gymnastics

Congratulations to Evie Ashurst who has been crowned British Gymnastics Women's Artistic Champion (British age group Level 2).

Evie has been training for six years, and she gained a place in the Great Britain squad after successful competitions, results and trials in 2022. After a year of competitions, she completed the compulsory gymnastics route and has now qualified for the British Championships in March. Evie is now classed as an elite gymnast.


Organists

Sofiia wrote a brilliant essay answering the question "How can long-term thinking in the field of Psychology foster optimism about the future?" The panel of judges were very impressed with Sofiia's essay, shortlisting it within a competitive field of over 1000 entries. Sofiia's prize is a free place at an OxBright academic conference.

Lauren's essay was titled 'Historical Pandemics: How Looking Back at the Past Can Create Optimism For the Future'. The judges commented that her



work reflected a deep understanding of the historical context and that her arguments were well-structured. She was awarded highly commended by

the judges, ranking in the top 20% of entries.



Geographers

Year 8 Geographers enjoyed a visit to Stratford-upon-Avon to undertake some primary data collection for their geographical enquiry on tourism. The visit allowed pupils to collect data to investigate various impacts of tourism in the town. Pupils gained experience of five different fieldwork methods including pedestrian counts, land use surveys and environmental quality assessments. The results gained were of really high quality and will be very interesting to present and analyse back in the classroom.

Royal Albert Hall

Year 6 pupils travelled to London to take part in the 'Earth Wonder' concert to celebrate our Land, Sea, Sky and Nature. The event, organised by the children's charity Barnardo's to raise funds for vulnerable children, was held in the prestigious Royal Albert Hall.

Over twenty choirs from across the UK came together to perform as part of a massed choir; the schools performed six songs alongside the Royal Philharmonic Concert Orchestra. The concert was hosted by Natasha Kaplinsky OBE, Broadcaster and Barnardo's Vice President together with artistic director/

conductor Ben Pope for the RPO. The Prep School was delighted to be announced as the winner of the Barnardo's fundraising competition, raising £881.73 through the non-uniform day held in November.



John Locke Essay

Well done to Bowen Cheung who received a High Distinction (top 5% of 19,000 entries) in the John Locke essay competition. His essay questioned 'Which characteristics distinguish successful movements for social change from unsuccessful ones?'

His approach consisted of applying Resource Mobilization theories, dimensioning characteristics, periodising movements, and analysing the concept of agenda seeding in a stratified bipartite society whilst looking at success as a relative continuum.

Swimming

The U13 girls competed in the ESSA National Finals at the Commonwealth Games swimming pool in Birmingham. Initially seeded 23rd from the qualification round, the team finished 20th overall improving both their overall time and position.

Rugby

This is a significant achievement and has only previously been achieved twice before in the school's long history of playing rugby.

Special Silk

The Art Department has been gifted some beautiful silk by Stephen Walters & Sons, who produced the silk for Queen Camilla's Coronation dress and Princess Diana's wedding dress. The Art Department are looking forward to putting the fabric to great use.

Stephen Walters' association with the British royal family dates back decades, and the company has been involved with numerous prestigious commissions throughout its history. Notably, in 1952, the company wove the lining fabric for Queen Elizabeth's Coronation robe, followed by the creation of the gown for Prince Charles' investiture in 1969. Stephen Walters further cemented its legacy by weaving the silk for Princess Anne's wedding dress in 1973 and, of course, the iconic silk fabric for Princess Diana's wedding dress in 1981.


Bromsgrovian News
