The team amassed an impressive 92 goals and only conceded 14 in all of the six matches played. We look forward to the National Finals to be held in March at Ipswich School.




Voting Rights





Research

The fifth annual Research Competition was hosted by Dr Rimmer, Master of Scholars. Teams were asked to prepare a five minute talk, accompanied by a five-slide presentation, to answer the question: What should the NHS invest in now to be future-proofed for 2030? This question was designed to task the teams to determine the most important focus for the next decade for healthcare in the UK.

Six teams entered the competition, with participants from Lower Fourth up to Upper Sixth, all demonstrating excellent levels of research and public-speaking skills. The judging panel was chaired by the Headmaster and accompanying judges - Mr Vice (Head of Chemistry) and Mrs Henderson (Wellbeing Nurse).

The winning team was a Fifth Form group of Bowen Cheung, George Hastings, Nicholas Hunt, and Hamza Suleman. They impressed the judges with their pragmatic and fiscally-sound ideas on improving three key areas efficacy, efficiency, and employability. Their prize is a trip to an escape room in Birmingham where they can further develop their outstanding communication and team-working abilities.
