The trip was rounded off with a visit to the Institute of Economic Affairs – the prominent 'think tank' with close ties to Thatcherism and 'Trussonomics' – where students heard from and asked questions of one of their leading researchers.





### Personal Statement

The Lower Sixth journey to making successful UK university applications started with an introductory session to preparing their Personal Statements. They are the first cohort applying with the new Personal Statement format, and we are excited to see their progress as they cement their passion for their subjects, and choose their future courses and universities.





### Mountain Biking

In the Pyraminx round Arjun Sanikop was 36th, Katherine Zhou was 40th, and Kimi Fickert was 44th. In the 2x2 round. Jessica Sessford was 53rd, Priya Madhavan was 54th and Anushka Giles was 56th. The children were fantastic competitors, and represented the School beautifully with their commitment to judging, helping and scoring.





### Research Competition

Five teams competed in the Tenth Annual Bromsgrove School Research Competition (BSRC). Students argued which language ought to be compulsory for all children to learn globally. Excellent argumentation was presented about the coding language Python, music as the language of empathy and connection, and various forms of signed language as a means of inclusion and personal development.

The winning team suggested that tactile sign language had a function beyond those people with complex needs who normally use it, and persuaded the judges that every child should learn it

Congratulations to Verity Williams and Emily Whittle who were Highly Commended; the grand prize of an escape room trip went to William Shirley, Agha Samad-Zada, Tom Punt, and Rufus Cole.

## Fencing

Nicholas Lo took part in the West Midlands Age Group Sabre competition where he worked hard to win the fight in his pool. After winning in the last eight round, Nicholas was in a top four position. He narrowly missed out on a win against the number one seed and eventual winner. Nicholas finished equal 3rd place and has now qualified for the British Young Championships National Age Group Finals, which will take place at the England Institute of Sport in Sheffield.



# Weather Presenters

Sara Thornton and John Hammond from BBC Weather, ITV Weather and the Met Office visited Bromsgrove Prep to speak to Years 7 and 8 in a special assembly. They gave us a whistlestop tour of their careers to date and shared tips on how to progress in the industry, as well as an important message about the increasing temperature. ## Public Speaking

Three members of the Junior Debating team took part in the second round of the prestigious ESU Churchill Public Speaking Competition. Only three teams could go through to the next round, and despite performing well, we did not progress to the next round. The students felt that they had learned a lot about this important skill.

## British Parliamentary

The debating team travelled to Nottingham University to take part in a British Parliamentary competition against schools from across the country. Over four rounds of debating, with everything from whether we should replace juries with AI, to the desirability of 'neediness' in inter-relationships, the students performed admirably and gained valuable experience. They were also delighted to catch up with OB Iain Messore (L 15-20) who was one of the competition judges, and who had been one of Dr Jewkes' first politics students at Bromsgrove.



### Oxford Union

Four teams took part in the Oxford Union Schools' Debating Competition regional qualifying round at RGS Worcester. With over thirty teams competing, and only four qualifying spots available, it was a fantastic achievement by Gleb Sovetkin and Nuraiym Turganbaeva to get into the top four. They will now travel to the Oxford Union in March for finals' day, where they will pit their wits against the best school debaters from across the country and around the world.




## Nigerian Reunion
