A Word from the Headmaster

As it does each year, at 11'o'clock on the eleventh day of the eleventh month, the School fell silent as we carried out our Act of Remembrance.

I am always struck by how well the whole School community, quite rightly, respects this moment as we remember all those who have given their lives in war, on behalf of all of us. Boards in the Memorial Chapel list the names of the Old Bromsgrovians who died in the two World Wars, about a hundred in each. Next to the flagpole, the replica

poppies, painstakingly made by the DT department, are individually inscribed with a year of death, a regiment and a name, and each one is dedicated to an OB who gave their life.

Of course, if we are not careful, the boards and the poppies just tell us names, and vet those who died in the two World Wars, and indeed those across the world who continue to die in war, were not and are not just names; they were people just like us. They too attended Bromsgrove; like us; they had

lessons in classrooms, took part in activities, represented their Houses, just like us; they did good things, and occasionally they got it wrong, like us; they had planned to leave School to go on to use their talents in the world as we hope to do.

It is so important that we always remember them.

Scholars' Evening

Nearly forty Performing Arts Scholars presented an outstanding showcase consisting of extracts from five classic plays of the 20th Century in Cobham Theatre, followed by our finest musicians taking to the concert platform in Routh Hall to play a wideranging programme of duets, ensembles and quartets from Mozart to Evan Hansen.

Drama

The Drama was by turns riveting, comical and intensely moving. From Elina Quito's wonderfully melodramatic lines from Macbeth as performed by a grand 17th century actress in April De Angelis' witty piece Playhouse Creatures about Restoration Theatre, through the intensity of Olivia McKelvey and Ewan Head in The Deep Blue Sea; the magnificent brooding violence of Dylan Foster-Agg as Brick, opposite Isla Chattin's Maggie in Cat On A Hot Tin Roof and the beautifully characterised and detailed performances of Hugo Blackwell, Jack Atkinson and Ewan Head (again) in quite the most superb evocation of a World War One trench so far seen on Cobham stage for Journey's End.

A very special mention must go to Ella Kenyon and Boris Belov who delighted everyone with their interpretations of Eliza Doolittle and Henry Higgins respectively in *Pygmalion* – ably supported by Shusank Nembang



and Tilly Richardson whilst for pure comic relief, Ethan Masterson must be thanked his hilarious performance as Mason in the otherwise deeply serious acting in *Journey's End*. This was a very classy set of scenes

and performances with production elements of the very highest quality as always from the magnificent settings, costumes, the atmospheric lighting and carefully chosen sound design.



Music

After the interval, and a change of venue, Fifth and Sixth Form music scholars entertained in ensembles ranging from clarinet quartets to vocal duet and musical theatre trios, a piano duet, jazz combo, wind trio and string group. Lectures were given by Hedera Screens and Holroyd Howe to pupils in the Sixth Form. Alistair from Hedera Screens spoke about how his company are working on using green screens in Schools around the country to reduce air pollution and how effective ivy is forthis. He also spoke about the School's own green wall, which they fitted and how this helps to regulate both flooding and the urban heat island effect as well as supporting biodiversity. Mark Hatton from Holroyd Howe gave a very informed lecture on the importance of food in the circular economy and the cooperate responsibility for ESG. Both lectures were wonderful extension opportunities for pupils from a wide range of subject and we are very grateful

On the second day, students enjoyed a tour of historic sites in Belfast city centre and West Belfast, before travelling on to Stormont where they were shown round the Assembly building and met with Alliance Party MLA and former Lord Mayor of Belfast, Kate Nicholl.

The trip was an eye-opening experience for all, and, despite some inclement weather, the students engaged brilliantly throughout and learned a huge amount about this fascinating but troubled region.



Is the UK becoming a police state?", drawing on Locke's theories on negative liberty to produce a sophisticated and cogent argument. Alex has stepped up in LawSoc to now act as the Research Officer for his fellow students, informing and inspiring the Lower Sixth to enter essay prizes themselves.

Well done also to Dexter Leung, whose entry into the John Locke Institute Global Essay Competition, in the Law section, has been shortlisted for a prize at the academic conference and prize ceremony which will take place later



this month. Dexter wrote a superblyargued essay addressing the question 'Your parents say that 11pm is your bedtime. But they don't punish you if you don't go to bed by 11pm. Is 11pm really your bedtime?'. In his essay, he delved into command law through the lenses of natural law theory and legal positivism, demonstrating outstanding critical thinking and research skills.
